		390 AD The Catholic Mass, a daily re-sacrificing of IESOUS.										1215 AD Catholic Transubstantiation of bread and wine, calling CHRISTOS down to their altar. Defined at the Lateran Council (Rome).

			196 AD The bishop of Rome (Victor) made the first attempt to standardize the celebration of Passover on Sunday.										
			321 AD Sun-Day Worship enacted as political law by the Roman Emperor Constantine "Let us have nothing in common with the most hostile rabble of the Jews" [...] "Let all the judges and town people and the occupation of all trades rest on the venerable day of the sun, but let those who are situated in the country freely and at full liberty attend to the business of agriculture."										
			364 AD The Council of Laodicea (earlier described as the 'lukewarm' church in the book of Revelation) forbade 'Judaizing' (observing the Sabbath on Saturday) and mandated Christians to work on that day while resting on Sunday instead.

BIBLE LANGUAGE	The Greek OT was written from ~284-140 BC and -predominantly- used for ~550-650 yrs.. IESOUS' apostles handed us the Bible down in -ONE- single language, consisting of the Greek Old and New Testament. The Hebrew OT was only 'reactivated' and popularized amongst 'Christians' after the Catholic Church introduced it through Jerome in 405 AD. Written originally in Greek: Codex Alexandrinus, Sinaiticus, Vaticanus; Translated from Greek: Gothic; Vetus Latina.												
	~120-180 AD Rabbi Akiva organized the Proto-Masoretic Text / Modern Hebrew Bible. He and his scribes manipulated 64% of the genealogies and shrunk the messianic timeline by ~1500 years, watered down prophecies pointing to IESOUS, concealed Cain's sin, et al.												
	382-405 AD Manipulated Proto-Masoretic Text now introduced through Pope Damasus & his secretary Jerome (Latin Vulgate published in 405 AD). Jerome translated initially from the Greek OT, but then switched to Hebrew.												
	1229 AD Council of Toulouse (RCC; France) made the Latin Vulgate the only authorized Bible, "expressly forbidding a translation into vulgar tongues" (any other language).												
	1234 AD Council of Tarragona (RCC; Spain): "If anyone is found to possess a Bible he must be turned over to the local bishop and burned at the stake."												
BISHOP OFFICE PRECURSOR OF POPE	sometime after 140 AD Stipulated through the Letters of Ignatius, which had most probably been impersonated after Ignatius' death (unbiblical 'Bishop' in the place of CHRISTOS + biblical overseers + biblical deacons). The Bible teaches CHRISTOS + overseers + deacons.												
	350-369 AD Gothic Bible translation by the Roman Catholic bishop Wulfila, who facilitated the creation of a whole plethora of new offices, by using in this translation 7 (!) different renderings for the same word 'APXIEPEYC' (high / chief priest). While the Bible stipulates exactly 2 offices for the New Covenant, both the Gothic Bible and the RCC employ ~ 9 offices.												
	366 AD First Pope of the Apostolic See of Rome

COUNCILS	No Councils (Jerusalem in 50 AD only an 'Assembly') The Bible uses the word (G4824, sunboulion = counsel, council) without exception in a negative way (related to Pharisees in Mat 12:14, Mat 22:15, Mar 3:6; to chief priests and elders in Mat 27:1, 7, Mat 28:12, Mar 15:1; to the Romans in Act 25:12). Councils do not feature special credibility as taught to us, but much rather supported extra-biblical tradition and transgressions throughout history.												
	~100 AD First council held in Jamnia (Israel) by teachers of the Jewish religious law; probably exclusion of Jewish Christians.												
	325 AD First Roman Catholic council held in Nicaea (modern Turkey); hundreds of councils since then.												
DIVINE NAME	THEOS, KYRIOS, I AM		350-369 AD Appropriation of the term 'G-d' (from 'Goth' - the tribe) through Wulfila into Arianism / Gothic 'Christianity'. He was a bishop, Arian & Roman Catholic (both simultaneously until his death), Pontifex & Primas, worshipped explicitly the 'Que*n', rejected the divinity of the HOLY SPIRIT and the deity of IESOUS CHRISTOS, and manipulated parts of the Bible.										
	IESOUS CHRISTOS (from Greek; first mention in Exo 17:8, 10 in the Greek Penta-teuch written in 284 - 246 BC)		405 - 1611 AD 1st manipulation of the divine name by the Roman Catholic Church, through Jerome. He removed in his Latin translation one letter, and now used 'Jesus' as the new divine name. This modified designation was later also used in English and 'Jesus' was printed until the King James Bible 1611.					~1524 AD Creation of the letter 'J' by Gian Giorgio Trissino, Papal Ambassador to Venice (who disinherited his son, archpriest Gulio, for his ingratitude to the popes and for siding with the Reformers).					
	1629 AD 2nd manipulation of the divine name. The KJV Bible revised in 1629 was the first English book in history to use the letter 'J' at all, and immediately used it for the divine name.												
MARIOLOGY	3c. AD Origen (Egypt) coined the term 'Theotok*s' (Mother of G-d)		~320 AD Constantine is displayed worshipping Mary.					425 AD Marian dogmas in the Roman Catholic Church; 431 AD Official doctrine (Council of Ephesus)					
	1954 AD Official Roman Catholic teaching (Ad Caeli Reginam), issued by Pope Pius XII, stating that Mary is called Que*n of Heaven!												
PURGATORY	Introduction in the form of the 'Mourner's Kaddish' through Rabbi Akiva; 3 prayers of mourning for 11 months.												
	370 AD Purgatory was now also introduced in the Roman Catholic Church.

CHRISTMAS 'CHRIST'S MASS'	~180 AD Irenaeus opened a 'can of worms' when he calculated March 25 as spurious conception date, based on a 'spiritualized' birthday of John the Baptist on the Day of Atonement (plus 6 months difference and 9 months of pregnancy).												
	274 AD The birthday of the official sun god of the Roman Empire, Sol In***tus, was celebrated on Dec 25, 274 AD.												
	336 AD The Roman (Philocalian) calendar now first recorded Dec 25 as CHRISTOS' birth. Continuous celebration since.												
HALLOWEEN ALL HALLOWS EVE	609 AD All Hallow's Eve was introduced as Pope Boniface IV dedicated the Pantheon (Pan-theion = "[temple of] all gods") to the 'Virgin Mary'.												
LENT	325 AD First official celebration in full accordance with-, and with an explicit mention through the council held in Nicaea.												
PASSOVER	Old Covenant Passover	196 AD The bishop of Rome (Victor) made the first attempt to standardize the celebration of Passover on Sunday.											
	325 AD The Nicaea council changed both the dating method and the schedule of the Passover Week / Unleavened Bread (later called Easter after the goddess Eo*tre).

MODERN HISTORY OF JUDAISM	Ancient Judaism	~33 - 70 AD Crucifixion of IESOUS CHRISTOS, subsequent destruction of the Jerusalem Temple.											
		2c. AD Rabbi Akiva: Creation & manipulation of the Proto-Masoretic Text (his student Aquila translated, and Yose ben Halaftha, one of his 5 principal pupils, standardized the manipulated text); creation of the Talmud and Mishna (Oral Laws despised by IESOUS).											
		132-135 AD Bar Kochba Revolt. Rabbi Akiva, an outsider and only a convert, gave Ancient Judaism its final blow by pushing Bar Kochba as the 'messiah' and therefore empowering him for 'his' revolt, and most probably having (tens of) thousands of his very own disciples fight and die therein. After CHRISTOS was killed, another messiah was proclaimed and the Holy Scripture had been corrupted, surely any divine favor was lost. More than 600.000 Jews died in (in-) direct consequence of Akiva's and Kochba's actions, and very few Jews survived.											
		2 - 20c. AD No 'physical' nation of Israel (Post-Roman Diaspora / Exile) Dispersed remnants throughout the world.											
	Aramaic, Greek, Hebrew	Mishnaic Hebrew	135 (~ 400) AD Cease of the Hebrew language as mother tongue (a direct consequence of the Bar Kochba revolt), except as literary-, official- and prayer language.								~1880 AD Revival of the Hebrew language.
